## Career Outlook

The message is clear—the national demand for nurses in all areas is surpassing the number of professionals available:

- > The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that by the year 2018, there will be a need for 581,500 more nurses in the workforce than will be available.
- > Discovernursing.com estimates a need for 800,000 additional nurses nationwide by 2020.
- > The need for nurses with post-graduate degrees is projected to grow 31 percent through 2022.
