In addition to the inauguration of Amy C. Novak, EdD, St. Ambrose is celebrating Homecoming 2021 on Oct. 1-3, providing a wonderful opportunity to reconnect with old friends, take a tour of St. Ambrose's buildings and grounds, or avail yourself of the campus' many amenities, with the help of the following resources.

COVID-19 PANDEMIC PROTOCOLS

All vaccinated and unvaccinated persons are required to wear a mask inside all campus buildings. Go to www.sau.edu/covid19 for the most up-to-date university protocols.

On inauguration day, St. Ambrose student ambassadors and volunteers will be stationed around campus to assist guests as needed. They will be wearing a special lanyard.

Many **HOMECOMING 2021** events are open to the public. Saturday features several on-campus activities including the Killer Bee 5K and Bumble Rumble (registration required) at 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. respectively. Join a campus walking tour at 9 or 10 a.m. or drop into the Archives open house between 10 a.m. and noon. The annual pre-game celebration, the Taste of Ambrose, starts at 11 a.m. on campus, followed by the football game at 1 p.m. at Brady Street Stadium. Afterward, attend a Star Party at 6:30 p.m. off-campus at the Menke Observatory. On Sunday, Oct. 3, celebrate Homecoming Mass at 10:30 a.m. at Christ the King Chapel. DINING

The Quad Cities has dozens of restaurants, from casual to gourmet, most within a 10-mile radius of the university. On campus, Cosgrove dining hall is open 7 a.m.-10:30 a.m. for breakfast; 11 a.m.-2 p.m. for lunch; and 4:30-6:30 p.m. for dinner on Friday, Oct. 1. You can grab a quick sandwich, salad, snacks, and grilled fare in the Rogalski Center Food Court. Hours are 11 a.m.-3 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 1, and 2-8 p.m. Saturday-Sunday, Oct. 2-3. The food court convenience store is open from 3-8 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 1. The Beehive Coffee Shop serves Starbucks coffee, smoothies, beverages and light snacks. It is open 7:30 a.m.-6 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 1 and from 8 a.m.-noon on Saturday, Oct. 2.

AROUND CAMPUS

You are encouraged to explore campus; main campus buildings, excluding residence halls, will be open until 5 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 1. Visit such historical buildings as **Ambrose Hall**, the center section of which was built in 1885 amid the grove of majestic oaks that still shade the campus' front lawn on Locust Street.

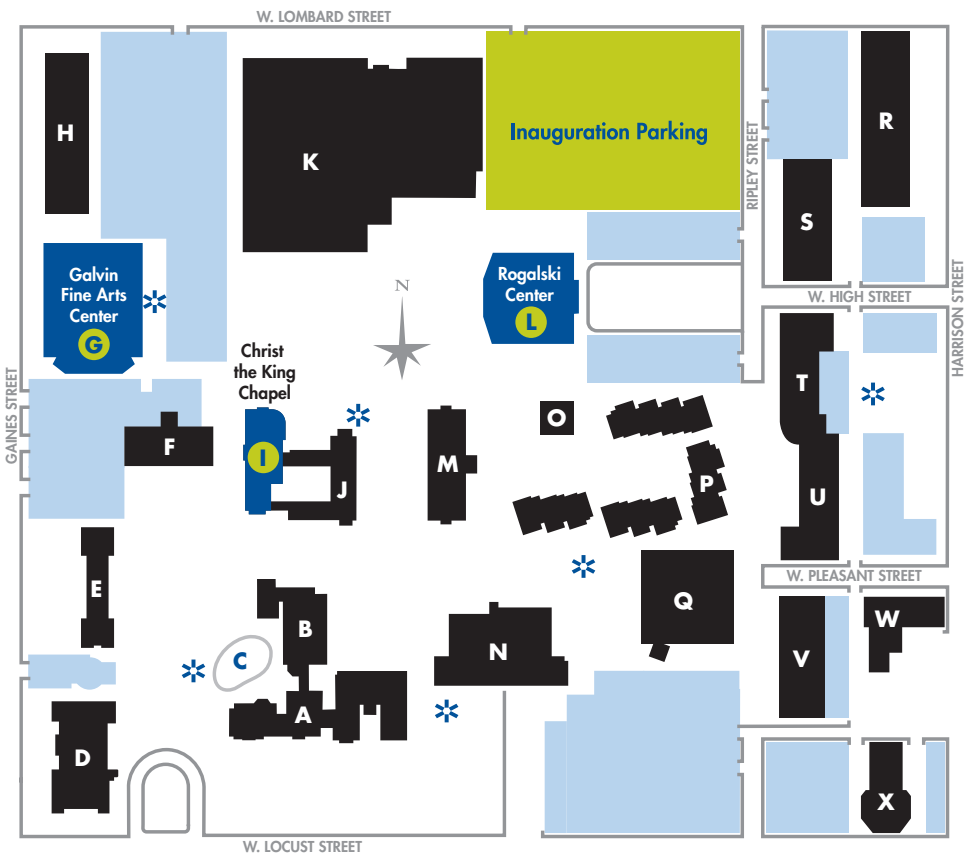
Between Ambrose Hall and LeClaire Hall is the **Grotto**. Nestled within a stone shrine is the statue of the Blessed Mother first given to St. Ambrose in 1922. Ambrosians have found the grotto's quiet setting a place of spiritual comfort.

Another space for prayer and contemplation is **Christ the King Chapel**. Among its features is the Chapel of Reservation on the south end of the sanctuary, where a Fr. Edward Catich-inspired stained glass window lights the Holy Eucharist. The third floor of Ambrose Hall

features the Fr. Joseph DeFrancisco Prayer Room. It provides daily prayer space for those practicing a variety of world religions.

The **Catich Gallery**, on the ground floor level of the Galvin Fine Arts Center, presents artwork by students and professional artists. Currently on display *Alt_Chicago: In Observance of Bedlam*, is a co-exhibit by artists Jon Veal and Jordan Campbell, who use art as a tool for neighborhood revitalization under their nonprofit, alt_. The gallery is named for renowned calligrapher and founder of the St. Ambrose Art Department Father Edward Catich.

The **Morrissey Gallery**, in the lobby of Galvin Fine Arts Center, exhibits the work of professional artists and students. Currently on display, *Romeo and Juliet: A Web Series in Shadow*, highlights the production and design work of St. Ambrose faculty and staff in the spring 2021 web series, *Romeo and Juliet*.
